WSA ARTS CALENDAR



WSA AGM 2012

The WSA Annual General Meeting was held at 7pm on Tuesday 23 October at ArtsPost. Twenty-two members attended the meeting.

Dianne's Presidential Annual Report follows.

Another year has been clocked up in the history of the Waikato Society of Arts. Some of it has been business as usual and some has been new and experimental. Our show case event, the New Zealand Painting and Print Making Award was, as usual, a resounding success with a large number attending the opening night as part of the Hamilton Summer Festival.

Financially it was a success but takings were down on the previous year. We sold around the usual number of artworks but the prices were lower and so our commission was down. A big thank you must go to the Vela family for their continued support of this event and to the NZPPA committee and organisers. In relation to NZPPA we were pleased to nominate Pam Nash for an Arts Waikato Award and were proud to see her receive this 'Outstanding Service to the Arts in the Waikato' trophy at a function in November. The other highlight in the WSA Calendar is the Members' Exhibition at ArtsPost. I was almost biting my fingernails two days before entries closed, but - on the day - members came up trumps with a full number of entries of a very high standard. Congratulations. I do urge members to get entries in early for exhibitions - especially Creativity Squared. Thanks also go to the Exhibitions Committee for organising a very successful workshop at Colin Gibbs' Gallery. I was sorry to miss the exhibition that followed on from this.

Anne Kalnins has continued with running the Arts School with an impressive enrolment figure of around 1000 students. We thank all the tutors for their continued devotion to the arts in Hamilton and to their students. I especially thank those who take on the challenge of the pre-school art classes. We trust that the wide range of Art School activities will continue to attract subsidies as funding for adult education classes in the high schools has dried up. More and more, WSA is meeting a community need.

The Business Art Award, sponsored by our Bankers, Westpac, was held again this year. We were pleased to see McCaw Lewis – long time WSA supporters - take out the winning prize with a work that paid tribute to public arts in Hamilton and which included a model of "The Ripple" – the public art work that this firm donated to the city at the opening of the Waikato Museum (of Art and History) in the 1987.

The Youth Art Award was won my Mikaere Gardiner from Wanganui with a painted plate collection. This attracted many interested viewers as the exhibition was held in a shop front in Centerplace. The success of this Award, as with many of our activities, is due to the hard work of the Exhibitions Committee and volunteers. Planning for the 2013 Youth Art Award is well underway and we have taken on board the desire for a Waikato as well as an overall prize.

In 2011 we worked with the University of Waikato to present a series of Art Lectures that were well attended by people with a variety of interests, each lecture inviting a different sector of the arts community. Unfortunately, because of cuts in adult education at the University we were unable to repeat this activity in 2012.

January 2012 was a sad month for WSA as three of our much loved and well respected members died: David Sayers, Mary de Lisle and Joan Travaglia. I also pay tribute to the memory of Heather Lomas who died just weeks later. We have to thank the Travaglia family for their generosity towards WSA in the many gifts of books and art materials from Joan's estate and for enabling us to purchase her printing press. The "acceptance" evening and "blessing" of this press was a memorable, if sad, occasion. The installation of the Travaglia Press was a reason for a "tidy up" working bee in the basement of ArtsPost and we thank all those who took part in this activity.

Two of our most respected members have done the WSA proud this year. Firstly, Joan Fear, our Patron, with the "Fearless: Celebrating the Art of Joan Fear" exhibition at the Waikato Museum, and secondly Barry Hopkins for his sponsoring the National Contemporary Art Awards. However controversial the latter may be, it does generate interest and discussion and keeps Hamilton on the New Zealand map in terms of the visual arts. We can't be said "to miss the bus"! I also mention David Lloyd's fundraising endeavours for Brazilian charity in his Amazonas exhibition. New activities this year have been responding to requests to have exhibitions in alternative venues. Ruth Davey mounted a very pleasing exhibition for the Hilda Ross Open Day in July, and Barry and Catherine Smith responded to an Accountants on London request to have an exhibition and presentation for their "customer evening". Both these were well attended and received.

Another new venture is our WSA 2013 Calendar very ably put together by Robin Cuff. Those of you who have not yet acquired your copies for your home and for Christmas presents are urged to get these while supplies last. We do hope that this will be an annual event and feature different artists each year.

The 2011-12 year has been an interesting one in terms of the structure of Arts organisation in the City. Creative Hamilton continues to exist as an elected body but with limited scope, and much of its former activity is being taken over by a new Trust, Creative Waikato. Arts Waikato no longer exists and its activities are also being taken over by the new Trust, chaired by Chris Williams with Sarah Nathan as its CEO. Hamilton City Council has also appointed an advisory Arts Forum to oversee and advise on its new Arts Policy. WSA has expressed its concern to the Mayor that we, as the largest community visual arts organisation in the City (and New Zealand), are not represented on this Forum. In the meantime, however, your Executive has been very vocal and made submissions to the City's Annual Plan and to the Long Term Plan about ArtsPost use and our ambitions for a dedicated City Art Gallery, along with and supported by Friends of the Museum. We have also met with Council officials regarding better use of ArtsPost space and work is progressing well on this. I attended the welcome for the

new Director of the Museum, Cherie Meecham and we have met and discussed WSA's policies and proposals.

A word of very sincere thanks goes to our staffers. Firstly to Eriko for her many years of dedicated and efficient service. Eriko was called to Japan hurriedly because of family illness. And, secondly, to Michelle who stepped in to her role – literally at the deep end, and who has managed us extremely well. As an organisation we have been well served by our staff who work beyond the call of duty and who enjoy the role. A word of thanks also to Jill Hobden who held the fort in the interim period.

I extend our thanks for our major funders and advertisers, and particularly to Barry Smith for editing our much praised and valued newsletter. When we receive praise from Auckland art critics we know it is of a very high standard. Finally, I thank the whole of the Executive of WSA who have given their time and energy voluntarily and who keep our organisation going, serving not only our membership but the wider Hamilton community. WSA is an organisation with a proud past in its contribution to this city and with an optimistic future as we continue to encourage participation in and appreciation of fine art.

Financial Report

Gary Douglas reported on the satisfactory finances of WSA and the following from the minutes explains proposed changes to the subscription management. When this is enacted it will resolve potential problems regarding art school pupils where pupils can now join WSA for a full year whenever they wish to take advantage of membership fee reductions.

Subscription Fee Management

Michelle advised the current subscriptions database is archaic and is investigating alternative software that may result in changes to the annual date structure. Michelle proposed a resolution to allow changes to be made to membership fees being charged on a 'date joined' rollover rather than the current annual date of 1st September. This type of structure will only affect new members, as existing members anniversary date will remain 1st September. It may also encourage more new members to join at the moment of interest any time through the year.

Resolved: The Administrator to investigate software solutions for suitability and report findings to the Executive

Committee who are empowered to make changes to the annual membership structure as required.

The WSA subscription rates remain unchanged.

CAMPBELL SMITH RECEIVES HONORARY DOCTORATE FROM WAIKATO UNIVERSITY.

WSA members will be delighted to know that long-time and life-member of WSA, Campbell Smith, was awarded an Honorary Doctorate from the University of Waikato at a graduation ceremony on the 17th October. WSA congratulates Campbell on his well deserved award. We can do no better than quote from the Waikato University press release.

"A man who's played a big part in Hamilton's art scene for more than 60 years will receive an honorary doctorate from the University of Waikato this week. Campbell Smith, artist, poet and playwright is a life member of the Waikato Society of Arts and a former



University of Waikato Chancellor the Right Hon. Jim Bolger, honorary doctorate Campbell Smith, and Deputy Vice-Chancellor Alister Jones at Waikato University graduation.

Art Gallery Director of the Waikato Art Museum. He is one of New Zealand's most noted wood engravers and many of his works reflect the river and its bridges. A book called Lines of Light features 110 of his wood engravings and his work is in collections at the Waikato Museum and Te Papa. "Mr Smith's contribution to the arts in Hamilton and the Waikato, as an administrator and a practising creative artist, has been huge, and we're delighted to acknowledge that by conferring our top honour," says University of Waikato Vice-Chancellor Professor Roy Crawford. "Mr Smith has been referred to as the elder statesman of the arts in Hamilton, and he and his colleagues laid a strong foundation for a thriving arts community we have today.""

And congratulations also to Campbell from WSA, not only on your honorary doctorate but on the publication of your entire collection of 20 plays (3 more?) but Steele Roberts. Orders are being taken now for this collection of Campbell's plays.

EX WSA ART SCHOOL PUPIL DOES WELL!

The winner of the Illumination Illusion Section of the 2012 World of Wearable Art Awards Show is Josephine Drysdall, formerly of Hamilton and daughter of member Jocelyn Drysdall. Josephine, who is an Archive Librarian in Christchurch, attended WSA children's classes in Hamilton. She has held exhibitions in Christchurch of her historical and fantasy corsets together with her partner Sebastian Denize, who works in metal and leather, and with her mother



Jocelyn's sculptures. Her entry was called "Shanachie for Lost Birds". She explains: The songs of the lost birds are no longer heard but the Shanachie (a Celtic storyteller) remembers and tells their stories.

GLASS ARTISTS RECOGNISED FOR WORK THAT REFLECTS NATURE

Two New Zealand glass artists have been recognised for their work, following the announcement of two prestigious awards. The Awards were announced at the opening of New Zealand's only outdoor glass sculpture exhibition RE:FRACTION, curated by Tim Walker and sited at The Sculpture Park @ Waitakaruru Arboretum, near Hamilton. The exhibition runs until November 18, 2012.

Karin Barr from the Waikato received the Vazey Child Glass Award for her subtle and sophisticated work 'Treasure Stones' and Jo Conroy from Wanganui was awarded the NZSAG Emerging Artist Award for her bold and playful sculpture 'Colour My World'.

Awards judge Dr. Carole Shepheard said that it was "no easy task" choosing the award winners from among the 20 pre-eminent New Zealand glass artists exhibiting at RE:FRACTION. But what stood out to her about Barr and Conroy's works was "how well they related to the site – a former quarry – the way each used their material and then extended its potential."

German-born Barr said that she was "excited and flabber-gasted" to win the Vazey Child Glass Award. To her, 'Treasure Stones' is a tribute to the former quarry site and an acknowledgement of the eight years that The Sculpture Park has been holding exhibitions. Located in the rock garden area of the Park, Barr's



nine iridescent glass stones cast subtle forms on the scree bank, their elusiveness created as they blended into the rocks and the dependence on the natural light to bring out their extraordinary colours.

Formerly of West Auckland, NZSAG Emerging Artist Award winner Conroy said that the "inspiration for 'Colour My World' came from the use of quarry stones enclosed in steel wire boxes to reinforce and make retaining walls." She saw beauty in the earth and rock layers, with the various strata's showing different colours and qualities. The combination of steel and glass



in her work "understood the balance needed between the two materials and both enhanced the other. The metal cage was nicely balanced and the blown ball shapes neatly 'packed' into the cube", said Shepheard.

A "M.O.O.C." CALLED "MOD.PO."

Al Filreis, much published Professor of English at the University of Pennsylvania, has been teaching contemporary poetry for over 28 years. His enthusiasm is boundless, his subject knowledge prodigious and the generous way in which he interacts with his students is a pleasure to observe. I'm one of those students in the biggest class Al has ever taught. There are 30,800 of us from over 100 countries and currently we're all in week 7 of a 10 week MOOC (Massive Open Online Course) called ModPo (Modern American Poetry). All resources are available online, not a drop of petrol is needed to attend the online seminars/ forums and the course fees come in at a very attractive \$0.00.

Right now as Week 7 begins we're about to embark on an analysis of the NY School of poets – Frank O'Hara, John Ashbery, Kenneth Koch and friends. Videoed seminars with Al and Students/Teaching Assistants (TAs) Anna, Dave, Max, Amarice, Molly, Ali, Emily and Kristen are held in the Kelly Writers' House on the Penn campus. After watching these any thoughts, questions, challenges and links can all be posted on the various forums where Al and the TAs pop up with amazing frequency to add direction or comment to the, often very erudite and occasionally passionate, discussion threads.

My course is one of over 200 being offered by Coursera, the online higher education venture which started up in April 2012. Since then 1.35 million students have enrolled and 33 partner universities are now offering free courses under this platform. Princeton, Stanford, Melbourne, Edinborough, Harvard et al, have all "joined the club".

According to NY Times writer Tamar Lewin, Ohio State University is one of the new Coursera partners. University President E. Gordon Gee is quoted as saying, "You're known by your partners, and this is the College of Cardinals. It's some of the best universities in the country."

Ohio State is about to offer 2 courses from its College of Pharmacy and Mr Gee has some concerns about giving away content with no revenue stream in sight.

"That does keep me up at night," he said. "We're doing this in the hope and expectation that we'll be able to build a financial model, and I don't know what it is but we can't be too far behind in an area that's growing and changing as fast as this one".

A Coursera success story recently appeared on National Public Radio in the US concerning a 22 year old computer science student, Askhat Murzabayev from Kazahkstan. His very small local university did not offer any Artificial Intelligence classes so he enrolled for free in Stanford's Machine Learning class on Coursera. Having gained his Certificate of Completion he then used it to support his job applications and now works for Twitter in Kazakhstan's largest city, Almaty.

Up to now most MOOCS have offered mainly math, computer science and engineering courses but recently diversification has occurred with options such as World History, Music and Animal Behaviour. For some Professors the opportunity to teach huge numbers of students all at one time is intoxicating. Coursera co founder Andrew Ng recently taught a class online that had 100,000 students. To reach that number of students he would have had to teach his normal Stanford class for 250 years.

My biggest difficulty over the last 7 weeks has been to stop "spreading the word". ModPo seems to crop up in all my conversations. Yes, I've done online learning before but never like this, never with such a huge international class of fellow students, never of such high quality and certainly never for FREE. Initially the course content was the reason I enrolled, but now I'm also fascinated by the process, the underpinning pedagogy and the very generous way in which such large numbers of students respond to each other, especially within the assessment framework.

Assessment involves 10 "quizzes", 4 x 500 word essay style assignments plus the assessment of essays from fellow students according to a marking rubric. There have been a few glitches with this process – not easy to manage in a subject as wide open as poetry – but no doubt these problems will be resolved with each course occurrence. After the final week all students who complete the assessment requirements will receive a Certificate of Completion from Penn.

So where is this all heading? There is a lot of MOOC mania around and this concept is certainly not a cure all. However, the online educational environment is growing fast. EdX, Udacity, ITunesU, OER, all offer frameworks similar to Coursera so in the short term those with an appetite for learning can feast away without \$\$\$\$ anxiety. My view is that right now all Coursera students are participating in a huge experiment. Once courses and methods have been refined fees will be charged, maybe initially for assessment and perhaps for higher level content.

Long term I'm uncertain just how MOOCs will develop but I do worry about the enormous debt burden being carried by 21st century graduates within our existing educational systems. We are in need of a new model and maybe MOOCs will prove to be a catalyst for change.
